UC FIRSTS: Leading the way

NASP was formed in 1980, making UCR the first University of California campus to open an office with a full-time staff dedicated to Indigenous student support. We're also the first (and only) UC to offer a Native American history Ph.D., and has the first American Indian chair endowment in the world! Another first? In winter 2019, UCR offered CAH001, an introductory course to the Cahuilla language, a local Native American tribal language — becoming the first UC to offer an Indigenous language series that fulfills graduation language requirements to all students. This series is especially important because our campus is situated on the traditional lands of the Cahuilla people.
